

PSYCHIC'S TOUCH GAVE ME BACK MY EYESIGHT

A WOMAN claims a psychic miraculously cured her of blindness, dyslexia and epilepsy in front of hundreds of witnesses — and a leading physician agrees.

Tayja Wiger of Afton, Minnesota, says psychic Marilyn Rossner simply touched her at a conference sponsored by the Spiritual Frontiers Fellowship at Carleton College, in Northfield, Minnesota.

Within 10 or 12 minutes, she says, all her ailments had vanished forever.

Astonishing

Dr. Jonathan Wirtschafter, a clinical professor at the University of Minnesota, in Minneapolis, confirms the astonishing disappearance of Wiger's blindness.

He examined Wiger a few months before. "The patient is legally blind," he wrote at the time. "She cannot distinguish light from dark."

However, Wirtschafter examined Wiger after the psychic healing and reported: "She has regained all her sight with the aid of a spiritual healer."

Rossner, head of the Spiritual Science Fellowship of Montreal, Canada, says she has had psychic powers for most of her life and that from the age of 14 she has been in contact with Swami Shivanada, an Indian spiritualist who specialized in treating the blind before he died in 1963.

Rossner says of Wiger: "The second I touched her, I felt a bolt of energy. There was a frequency in my body — a motion that came from elsewhere."

"I placed my hands over Tayja's eyes. I found my breathing perfectly synchronized with hers, as if

we were one. Then I went into a complete trance, which I'm told lasted 10 to 12 minutes.

"Suddenly, I could hear Tayja yelling: 'I can see —



God is real — I can see."

Wiger adds: "The thing I was aware of was that there were a lot of eyes coming together. Then there was a big pop. Then I started to see some light."

"I started yelling, and each time I called out I could see more and more light."

She adds that before the healing service, she suffered about two epileptic seizures a month, even though she was on medication. Afterward, she stopped the medication but has not had a single seizure.
